
A limited number of handouts will be available. Bring a pencil or pen to takes notes.

New Melones Outing Report Bob McCollum

On Saturday February 11, Martin Plotkin, Ken Gotelli, Bart Hughes and I fished New Melones reservoir on a TVFF outing. Martin and Ken were kind enough to offer their boats for this outing. We met at the Glory Hole boat ramp at 7:30 AM. Our initial objective was the Angel Creek inlet on the north end of the lake. The Angel Creek inlet turned out to be a bust – no takes and very few fish registered on the fish finders. Apparently the warmer than usual winter caused the fish to move out of the inlet pool earlier than usual. So we moved to the opposite end of the lake to the Bear Creek and found lots of fish slurping midges. I had brought few dries with me, but I rigged up a water boatman on a floating line. On my first cast a nice 3-4 pounder torpedoed on my fly. She put on quite a show for us. Things got slow after that. We continued to fish wooley buggers on sinking lines or shooting heads. Bart eventually brought one to hand on a brown wooley bugger. We called it a day around 2:00 PM.

We have a great signup for our outing on March 24 to the Kistler Bass Ponds to fish for largemouth bass, crappie and bluegill. March 24 was chosen due to its being only two days from the new moon, which hopefully will be a prime time for this trip.

If you missed the first announcement, this is a one-day trip to the Kistler Ranch which is located 17 miles north of Oakdale. We will have exclusive access to three large ponds that have provided club members with many good days of fishing over the years. I have fished the ponds with both 6 wt and 4 wt rods, floating and

Believe me, the three ponds will provide more than enough room for the sixteen we have signed up and many more. Politics- Run-A-Muck

We are now facing yet a new crisis in our states water management policies. A new Bill HR-1837, (authored by Representative David Nunes of Visalia) has emerged in the House of Representatives in Washington DC. It is designed to threaten nearly all of the progress that has been made, over the last several years, in resolving the water management policy issues of our state.

The bill has been under consideration for a while now, however, my opinion was that it was so radical and based on completely flawed and distorted reasoning that it had no chance of ever passing. It now appears that I was totally wrong. It has passed The House Resources Committee and will be voted upon on the House Floor in the very near future. I would never have guessed it would have gotten this far, and it is very important that we find a way to kill it before it goes any farther.

The bill, if passed, would place almost all of the regulation of our water in the hands of the federal government. This would be contrary to the way water is currently managed throughout the nation. In other words, if the bill is implemented California would be the only state in the union that would have its water resources controlled by the federal government. It is difficult to comprehend that our elected officials could allow this to happen, but I guess you never know.

A summary of some of the issues with the bill are listed as follows:

- 1. It eliminates environmental protections for salmon and other endangered species.
- 2. It overturns the court ordered restoration of the San Joaquin River that is currently being accomplished.
- 3. It destroys all the progress that has been achieved over the last few decades to restore the Delta Region, its water quality, the reliability of its levees, and its fisheries and their habitat.
- 4. It eliminates the progress that has been achieved to encourage water users to implement water conservation measures.
- 5. It violates the Congressional principal that requires the federal government to follow state water laws whenever possible.

One of the major arguments that supporters of the bill use, is that it would restore jobs for thousands of farm workers in the south of the Central Valley. A study of this issue has proven that the principal reason for the high unemployment rate in that area is the lack of construction jobs and is not significantly related to reduced water deliveries to the region. In addition the implementation of the bill would eliminate hundreds of jobs in the commercial and recreational fishing industry.

The California Environmental Water Caucus, consisting of numerous environmental, environmental justice, recreational and commercial fishing groups, legal and advocacy groups, and Indian tribes is organizing an aggressive campaign to attempt to kill this bill. TVFF will be included in this group.

However, if the bill passes the House of Representatives we will need to do everything possible to make sure it is soundly defeated in the Senate. Please be prepared to contact our Senators (Barbara Boxer, & Dianne Feinstein) and urge them to make sure it dies there. We, as fishermen, are naturally concerned about how much damage this bill would have on our fisheries, but more importantly the water grab that this bill represents will have serious negative impacts that go far beyond just the devastation of our fisheries.

Local Fishing Reports: Ken Tetzel

I've been fishing the Lower Stanislaus River just below Goodwin Dam. Not much success in the way of steelhead for me, but I've been landing a half dozen trout per outing while losing about the same number. I have been mostly nymphing very deep with #14 and #18 BH nymphs. The rainbows have been fairly strong in the 12" to 14" size range. Flows have been high and access to most holes and runs are tough, but doable.

I tried the Calaveras River last weekend below New Hogan Reservoir. There is very low water on the Calaveras River right now. Not much luck nymphing usual riffles, but some trout are looking up. I managed 7 trout on dry flies and lost 2 or 3 while stripping small #20 black midge patterns. Go Figure??!! All the fish I caught were small in the 10" range, but nicely spotted natives.

My Pinky Shad Fly

Fly type: Attractor – used for shad in May

and June

Originator: Bob Souza Tied by: Bob Souza Hook: 1197 size 6-10 Thread: Pink size 210 Tail: Pearle Flashabou

Body: White Chenille with pink collar Eyes: 5/32 bead chain Silver or Gold

Hackle: Pearle Flashabou

Head: Pink thread

- 1. Debarb hook if needed. Apply glue to front 1/4 of hook.
- 2. Start thread at eye and move back ¼ shank of hook. Tie in bead chain eyes at this point with figure eight wraps.
- 3. Move thread back to bend of hook and tie in Flashabou tail. Now wrap two or three layers of thread on hook shank end thread at bend of hook. This will show through under body when wet.
- 4. Start White chenille at bend of hook and wrap forward to eyes tie off. Add one wrap of pink chenille at this time and tie off.
- 5. Add Flashabou hackle on each side of bead eyes. Tie in eight to ten pieces of Pearle Flashabou on each side.
- 6. Form head in front of eyes with thread and whip finish head.

Have a good time fishing this one.




DeltaStripers.Com - Jerry Neuberger
