Opening the LPR&G club house at 6:30 to allow for more social time seems to be catching on. We'll keep it up if you all keep arriving early.



Trinity River Strategies and Fishing the Lower Yuba River and tailwater tactics

- •The first speaker will be TVFF member **Brian Endlich**, who will provide a timely ten (10) minute subject on points of access for river location and strategies for fishing the Trinity River during high traffic seasons.

Delta Striper Outing December 7, 2013

As TVFF Fishmasters, Rick Mikla and I will lead the striper outing on Saturday, December 7th. This is a great opportunity to experience hard pulling, double digit freshwater fish on fly gear. We will fish the Southern bays of Discovery Bay and plan to launch out of Orwood Resort by 7:00AM. You should arrive at least ½ hour earlier in order to set up and get your boat in the water. We will head South about one mile to the Kellogg Creek entrance of Discovery Bay. This is an all-safe 5 mph area and it works well for both small and larger size watercraft. The outing will take place in rain or shine, but plan on a cold morning and the possibility of morning fog for a few hours (we hope the weather cooperates better than last year!)

A boat is required to participate in this trip. Boaters and non-boaters will need to make arrangements and get paired up before the outing.

Equipment: 8, 9 or 10 wt rod with Hi-Speed / High Density shooting heads. Lead core heads, Teeny 300, Rio Outbound or Mastery Custom Tip Express lines trimmed to match the rod all work well. The integrated style lines are easier to cast than lead core. Your leader is simply 5-6 ft of 15 - 20 lb mono (Maxima). Flies that simulate baitfish patterns such as 3-5 inch Clouser minnows, Flashtail Whistlers, Deceivers, etc. work well. The 2/0 chartreuse and white Clouser is a standard. Take a look at past newsletters for December and January of '11 and '12 for what has been successful. We will provide more information as we get closer to the outing and we can get more specific as the stripers keep move in, which usually starts around mid to late October. It is looking like a good season this year with lots of bait already arriving and being chased by hungry stripers!

Each day after the clinic the group adjourned to the café at Moss Landing for brunch. A great time was had by all.









October 22nd and 23rd Bob McBride and Martin Plotkin finished with the guide Jim Roberts on the upper Klamath River. Between the two anglers in excess of 100 fish were caught and landed. Many of course are jokingly referred to as big Macs (actually should be quarter pounders). On the Klamath, fish are considered Steelhead when they are over 16 inches long. Of the hundred odd fish caught at least 40+ fell into this category, a few in the four to 5 pound range. In addition several salmon were hooked and two landed. Unlike last year, no rods were broken.

An Angler's Visit Ken Gotelli

My wife and I left on a warm morning in August pulling a trailer loaded with bedroom furniture, clothing boxes and school supplies and drove north on I-5. We were delivering our daughter to Chico and moving her into her new house. She was now a junior at Chico State.

Chico offers a lot for the outdoorsman and I had neglected to engage in any of it the last two years while my daughter has been in Chico. So, when we got into Chico, I stopped by the Chico Fly Shop and talked with Larry. He was pleased and willing to tell me about the year-round fishing opportunities on the Sacramento and Feather Rivers and Little Chico Creek for Salmon, Steelhead, Stripers, and Trout. What piqued my interest was the upcoming Steelhead run on the Feather which peaks from September 15 through October 15.

So, while I unloaded my daughter's belongings from the trailer to her "new" 100 year old rental house, I was planning our next visit to see our daughter. It just happened to be during the peak Steelhead run. Two and one half months have now gone by and my wife and I were looking forward to seeing our daughter again. It was the middle of October and we were driving back up to Chico for a visit. This time I had my fishing gear.

When we arrived in town, I paid Larry at the Fly Shop another visit. He helped me hi-light the better runs on my StreamTime map. Larry's report was that the flows were up slightly and the fishing was only fair. I thanked Larry and we left to go visit with our daughter. I spent couple of hours with my daughter and her roommates. It was a perfect fall day with not even a breeze. Then, I excused myself for the 30 minute drive to Oroville to scout the river. Poring over the notes on my map, I drove the roads looking for the runs Larry described. I found three or four of them, but every one of them was occupied by other fisherman. I was disappointed, but decided return at first light the next morning and try the best run.

My 5:30am alarm sounds and I reach blindly in the darkness of my hotel room trying to find the off switch. I shower, get dressed and grab the stale poppy seed muffin and un-ripe pear room service left at my door and wash it down with orange juice. I close the door quietly so as not to wake my wife. As the door latches shut, my excitement begins to build. I find my car in the dark parking lot and head south towards Oroville and the Feather River. I pull off the highway and turn into a dark gravel road. The gravel crunches under my tires. I turn on my high beams as I drive to the end of the road and pull into a turnout. No other vehicles are here. A good sign.

I pull on my waders, lace up my wading boots, zip up my vest and proceed down the road, then off to the left along a trail to the river. The run is still a couple hundred yards up the bank. There are King Salmon everywhere in the river. Up close to the bank and in the middle. Most are in small groups. They spook easily, churning up the water. Most are between ten and twenty pounds. Some are huge. There is a smell of rotting fish. Dead salmon litter the shore and the shallows and are in various stages of decay. It's an amazing sight.

The sun is just beginning to rise as I reach the run and wade out into the current. I make my first cast up river into the seam of the current, where fast meets slow. My nymph sinks in the current and drifts by me as my indicator is pulled under. I lift my rod and set the hook and a Steelhead jumps in front of me. It immediately shakes the hook, and I smile. This is going to be a good day.

I make several more casts, each methodically covering a different section of the run when I hook another fish. This time it's hooked solidly and after several jumps I slip my net under the fish and admire it's silver gill plate with bright red cheeks with iridescent blues and purples. A pink stripe goes down her sides. I pull the small nymph out of her lip and she races away. I continue fishing and have several more fish shake the hooks quickly, but I end the morning with three solid hookups and two fish to the net.

An Angler's Visit Continued

It's 10:00am and I am now looking forward to spending the rest of the day with my daughter. On my walk back to my truck along the river's edge, I spook more large Salmon resting in the shallows, awaiting their fate. The rest of the day and evening offers near perfect fall weather as my wife and I, our daughter and her roommates sample many of Chico's food stops, shops, and beer joints. Chico is a college town with a lot of character. Mostly young adults line the streets. Good food, old Victorian buildings, lots of trees, and "interesting" people can be found here.

5:30am comes quickly the next morning. I get out of bed and make a cup of hotel coffee. It tastes bad but I need the caffeine. The drive to the river seems to take longer this time, but the walk down the road and along the river in the dark is easier this time around. Salmon still scatter when I walk by. I wade into the river around sunrise, carefully short-stepping over the slippery rocky bottom. In position now, I pull line off my reel and roll cast my flies about a rods length away, mend and feed line, waiting for the indicator to tell me I've got a customer. But it doesn't happen this time. I manage to land two nice hen Steelhead in the next hour and then nothing the next hour. I cover the entire run from top to bottom before I start to lose focus when on a very long drift I get a solid hookup.

A bathtub sized swirl erupts near my indicator. Line leaves my reel with a scream. I palm my reel, but it never slows. My reel handle slaps my palm with every blurry revolution. It hurts. I'm already deep in my backing. My mind races and yells at me; "get to shore, chase it downstream! Tighten your drag! Move your hand away from the reel handle! Do something!" I gather my whit's and realize that there is not much line left on my reel. The fish surfaces about 175 yards downstream. It's a King Salmon in the twenty five pound range. I tighten my line and pull back on my rod. It doesn't budge with my 7 weight rod. I realize then that I'm not going to win this fight. The law says you must break off a salmon if you hook one, but I don't want to. I palm my reel tight, the leader stretches and breaks. I'm disappointed. I reel in my line and it seems to take forever. Then I realize that was awesome!

Not a bad visit. I had a great time with my daughter *and* fit in some fly fishing. Everything seems to be better when you add angling to the trip. I'm looking forward to visiting my daughter in February when then next run of fresh Steelhead comes to spawn. I just wish that I figured this out during her freshman year.

Conservation Corner Our "Legally Granted" Rights in Question Derrell Bridgman

Once again, my conclusion that legally attained agreements with politically based organizations are, for all practical purposes, worthless, was emphasized by way of a new source. The source this time was a small local newspaper in Calaveras County, and the agreement was related to water rights.

I picked up a local newspaper in a store in Arnold CA (near my cabin) and found an article written by one of its editors pointing out the unjust management policies used in the distribution of one of our most valuable resources <u>"WATER"</u>. The editor was pointing out that reliability of Calaveras County's water supply is not as stable as that of San Diego County.

The irony of this situation is that Calaveras County is located in an area with an abundant, natural water supply. It's resources consist of multiple year-round, free-flowing rivers, creeks, and streams, plus springs, lakes, reservoirs, etc. The area is historically blessed with abundant rain and snow, and has historically provided local residents with a more than ample supply of water. On the other hand the San Diego County is situated in an arid desert type region, void from sufficient local water sources.

Furthermore, the two geographical areas differ substantially in population. Calaveras County has a sparse population of less than 45,000 citizens while San Diego county has a population of nearly 32,000,000 (approx., 700 times as many).

Clearly something is wrong. A region with many more people (with greater water demands) but much, much less natural water resources has a more reliable supply than an area with fewer people (and fewer water demands) and an abundant natural supply, just doesn't add up.

Of course we know why this is. Much of Calaveras's resources are being taken from them while San Diego is being granted generous supplies from other regions (a major source is coming from the Calaveras area). This same situation also exists for other neighboring counties of Calaveras (northern California) and San Diego (southern California) counties.

These water transfers have been established and regulated by our state (and federal) water management agencies. The management policies were established many decades ago. Northern California water customers readily agreed to share their surplus supplies with their Southern California neighbors so a very elaborate water management and distribution system was established and implemented.

Before long before politics and greed started degrading the terms of the agreement. One of the major conditions of the agreement was that only surplus water would be diverted to southern users. Users in the area that the water comes from had the first right to it in accordance with their needs.


However, as water deliveries began to our southern neighbors, more and more uses were found, and soon they were lobbying for additional supplies. Additional water made the area attractive to more and more people and created opportunities for additional agriculture in areas where it was not possible without the extra water. Domestic uses grew and new agribusinesses thrived. It wasn't long before the thirst of our neighbors grew for much more water than we could supply. Of course the fact that we (in the area of the water source) had the primary right to the water that we need was soon forgotten and more and more was diverted in accordance with political and financial priorities.

We are now faced with water management policies that have agreed to supply more water to our neighbors than is physically available. Many of the requirements for water in our area (like fish survival) are not being met, while unrealistic uses (like large farming operations in areas that efficient use of the water is not possible) continue to thrive. In other words; wealthy agribusiness owners and the larger number of voters in the southern end of our state have a much larger voice than the smaller number of voters in our area and the fish that have no money and can't vote.

It is clear that this issue is becoming more serious and will not be resolved soon. It is a shame that our descendants will inherit such a mess.
