Trinity River Steel Tom Vargas

Bob McCollum and I headed for Weaverville and the LaGrange Restaurant and arrived just in time to watch the 49er Seahawk game on Sunday, January 19th. We should have taken our time!

We fished on Monday and Tuesday with guides Jeff Parker Dave Neal. We had two days of tough fishing by Trinity River standards, but we are probably spoiled by the great resource we have to our North. Over the two days we boated 4 fish and had 6 hook-ups, which would be good steelhead fishing in most places!

I was lucky enough to boat a wild 30 inch, 10 pound buck on Tuesday morning, which made my trip. Weather was beautiful with cold mornings in the low 20's and ice in our rod guides and afternoon temperatures in the high 50's with lots of sunshine. The best fishing was in the morning and late afternoons.





A Lower Yuba Steelhead Heartbreak ! Russ O'Brien

This was my second fishing trip in 2014. Marty Loomis and I fished the Lower Yuba River on Wednesday, January 22nd as we took advantage of guide Frank Hasting's January Special for Tri-Valley Fly Fishers. We met our guide at the Hwy 20 bridge a little before 8:00 am and soon started our full day float. Frank explained that the river was lower than usual for this time of year, about 725 cfs, but quite fish able.....very clear, steady flows......lots of great water......good runs, deep pools, plenty of character and fish habitat......we hooked fish throughout the day, landed several 10-15 inch rainbows and one steelhead of about 18".....and then towards the end of the day, Marty hooked a **HUGE** steelhead.....we estimate 30+ inches.....and after a 20-25 minute battle, this day the fish God was on the Steelhead's side...... as Marty brought the monster to the net, one quick turn by the fish and the leader broke and it got away.....our guide Frank says it was the largest steelhead he has ever seen in the Yuba in over 25 years of fishing there.


Needless to say we were all disappointed with not netting the monster, but Marty did a great job playing the fish and it seemed like the fish was tired and ready for the net.....and we saw enough of the Steelhead to see it was a beauty. We had a great day fishing....lots of action.....we fished both nymphs and dries....at times up to three nymphs below our indicator and even threw a few Skwala dries at rising fish.....only two came up to check out Marty's fly. The fish were not rising often, but with the warm mild temps and weather.....Skwalas have been showing up on previous drifts. The other nice thing....for the first couple of hours we had the river to ourselves....and only two other drift boats and a couple of fly fishers on pontoon boats shared the five mile stretch of river with us. It was a peaceful, pleasant day.

Although Frank's Special only ran through the end of January....his 2014 daily rate of \$400 for two is still a bargain. So if you want a great day of fishing on a beautiful river with plenty of chances to hook into one of the famous Yuba steelhead.....give Frank a call at (530) 518-6952.....You won't be disappointed.

It is an easy tie so we should have time for a couple of variations of Jays pattern.





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Conservation Corner – New Zealand Mudsnails Roger Perry

I intend to comment on New Zealand mudsnails this month, but I also wanted to mention the presentation by California Natural Resources Secretary John Laird. At the time of this writing, John is scheduled to speak at the Dublin City Council Chambers this Thursday (Jan 30) at 6PM on the California Water Action Plan (the delta bypass tunnels). I plan to attend and hope to be able to comment in next month's newsletter.

I thought I would comment on New Zealand Mudsnails, some of the problems they pose and some of the things we can do to minimize their spread.

The New Zealand mudsnail is a threat to our waters. It competes with native invertebrates for food and habitat and has a detrimental impact on fish populations and vegetation. Mudsnails can tolerate a wide range of habitats, including brackish water. Mudsnails are easily transported to new habitats by recreationists because they readily attach to waders, boot soles and other equipment. They can live for weeks in damp cool conditions.

To prevent the transfer of mudsnails, the following is recommended:

- 1. If possible, keep several changes of field gear for use in different bodies of water.
- 2. Clean all gear before leaving a site, scrubbing with cleaned and a stiff-bristled scrub brush and rinsing with water, preferable high-pressure. This is often the simplest and most effective for prevention.
- 3. Inspect gear before it is packed for transport. Visible traces of sand, mud, gravel and plant fragments are signs that gear has not been properly cleaned and mudsnails may have been retained.
- 4. Select a treatment method in addition to scrubbing and rinsing if mudsnails are present or suspected to be present. The two most common treatment methods are physical and chemical:
 - A. Physical methods:
 - i. Freeze your gear for a minimum of 4 hours at a temperature of 26^o F or less.
 - ii. Soak gear in a bath of hot water (at least 120⁰ F) for 10 minutes. This method is not recommended for Gortex.
 - iii. Dry your gear before reuse. A drying time of at least 48 hours under low humidity is recommended to remove all pockets of dampness.
 - B. Chemical methods:
 - i. There are many chemical disinfectants available; however these may adversely affect gear. Choose one compatible with your equipment.

Conservation Corner Continued TVFF HELPS PROVIDE FISH SANCTUARY

Under the direction of Fisheries Biologist Pete Alexander and other East Bay Regional Park District personnel, five members of TVFF and about 90 other conservation and ecologically concerned individuals gathered at Quarry Lakes Regional Park in Fremont on January 4 to provide habitat for newly spawned fish in the lake.





After a quick Continental breakfast, the Park district personnel explained the task before us. They had assembled over 1000 former Christmas trees at the lake, and staked out lengths of heavy chain on the currently dry lake bed. Our job was to move trees to the chain and lay the butts across the chain with the tree tops pointing away, alternating the direction the tips pointed. Lengths of heavy nylon cord were then used to tie the butts to the chain.

As the winter rains come and the lake fills, the trees will provide structure for insects to hatch in and for newly hatched fish to use for protection from predators. In addition to TVFF folks, the work force consisted of Boy Scout troops, 4H club members and middle school classes. The job was done in less than three hours and we were treated to a hot lunch.

We were told that due to Water District restrictions this will not be done at Del Valle, but we look forward to helping with this great project in other locations as called upon.





Turn right onto May School Road and proceed to stop sign at intersection with Dagnino Road (~1 mile).

Entrance to Rod and Gun Club is directly across intersection
