Jeff Bright Spey Fishing on Larger Rivers

TVFF is fortunate have one of the world renown Steelhead fisherman, writer, artist, photographer and world traveler. Come and meet Jeff as he talks about his 30 years of experience chasing Steelhead and hosting trips available to all of us from British Columbia to Patagonia.

"In 2002, Jeff published Found in a River: Steelhead & Other Revelations (Frank Amato Publications). Using photo-montage and sparse prose, the book chronicled the beginnings of a flyfishing passion and eventually opened the door to destinations further afield. In 2003, Jeff made his first visit to northwest British Columbia's famous Skeena River and by the end of 2005 had become a booking agent for Nicholas Dean Lodge in Terrace, hub of the lower Skeena Valley. As of this writing, between March 2003 and March 2014, Jeff has logged over 60 weeks in the Skeena region, experiencing all seasons, as well as over a half-dozen summer weeks on BC's Dean River, considered by many to be the crown jewel of summer-run steelhead rivers. Most recently Jeff has expanded his travel business to include expeditions to Tierra del Fuego for giant sea trout and the Russian Kola Peninsula for Atlantic salmon."

Delta Striper Outing December 10, 2016 Tom Vargas

As TVFF Fishmaster I will lead the striper outing on Saturday, December 10th. This is a great opportunity to experience hard pulling, double digit freshwater fish on fly gear. We will fish the Southern bays of Discovery Bay and plan to launch out of Orwood Resort by 7:00AM. You should arrive at least ½ hour earlier in order to set up and get your boat in the water. We will head South about one mile to the Kellogg Creek entrance of Discovery Bay. This is an all-safe 5 mph area and it works well for both small and larger size watercraft. The outing will take place in rain or shine, but plan on a cold morning and the possibility of morning fog for a few hours.

A boat is required to participate in this trip. Boaters and non-boaters will need to make arrangements and get paired up before the outing.

Equipment: 8, 9 or 10 wt. rods with Hi-Speed / High Density shooting heads. Lead core heads, Teeny 300-400, Rio Outbound or SA Custom Tip Express lines trimmed to match the rod all work well. The integrated style lines and tungsten heads are easier to cast than lead core. Your leader is simply 5-6 ft of 15 - 20 lb mono (Maxima). Flies that simulate baitfish patterns such as 3-5 inch Clouser Minnows, Flashtail Whistlers, Deceivers, etc. work well. The 2/0 chartreuse and white Clouser is a standard. Take a look at at Dan Blanton's Board for what is currently happening.

We will provide more information as we get closer to the outing and we can get more specific as the stripers keep move in, which usually starts around mid to late October. It is looking like a good season this year with lots of early stripers being caught out in the Western Delta!

Announcing destination fishing trip to British Colombia fishmeister: Martin Plotkin

This is a really great experience for novice to advanced anglers. I've been on this trip at least 3 times before. It involves a really nice lodge with a well-run operation. The Stewart family has been doing it for over 50 years. It includes 7 nights accommodation at the lodge with 6 days being flown to remote lakes or rivers.



Date: Friday, July 7th 2017 to Friday, July 14th 2017

Location: Based at Stewart's lodge, http://www.stewartslodge.com/new.htm, on the Chilcotin Plateau about 200 miles NNW of Vancouver, BC. I've been to the lodge 3 times and consider it a 1st class operation. Very nice, well run and maintained facility.

Activity: Trout fishing at remote rivers and lakes about 15 to 45 minute flying time from the lodge (weather permitting).

Cost: Canadian \$2,650 (about US\$2,050) as of this week.

Limited: 8 anglers max. – 4 min. The first 8 deposits received will go.

Deposit: US \$500 before October 7th, 2016.

2017 Pyramid Lake Outings, Spring and Fall:

Spring 2017 Pyramid Lake Outing:

Last month I put out an e-mail and a sign up sheet for the spring Pyramid Lake Outing. This is a guided outing with Rob Anderson and Co. The Spring fishing is from step ladders which Rob provides and sets up on the edge of the drop off. The ladder allows you to cast further and keeps you warmer by keeping most of your body out of the water. Sounds odd, but it's a lot a fun. The ladders are set about 25 feet apart so it becomes a very social outing with good-natures banter, bragging, ribbing. The fish, two species of Lohantan Cutthroat Trout typically run from 4-8 pounds., But there is the very real potential to hook and land a double-digit monster. See pictures from past years.

Dates: Friday March 24 through Saturday March 25. (Potential option for third day on Thursday, March 23 if enough interest - min. 6 anglers.)

We will be joining guide Rob Anderson who will be hosting a seminar for the group for the outing. Rob will be providing ladders, flies and breakfast/lunch for both days and the cost is \$190/person for two days (March 24-25). The option for the 23rd will cost an additional \$90/angler, minimum 6 anglers. Advance payment required to hold your spot. Reservations are first come-first served based on receipt of payment. Please send me an e-mail letting me know if your intent to sign on and whether you want 2 or 3 days of fishing. Then snail-mail me a check for \$190 to reserve your spot.

Conservation Doug Witmore

Enclosed is my Conservation Post for TVFF membership to review. This letter from Curtis Knight expresses concern for change and potential challenges eminating from new Trump administration policies for federal environmental regulation. Cal Trout, as always, will be participating in projects designed to ensure resilient wild fish in healthy California waters. Some of their concerns and objectives are outlined below. Continued support of Cal Trout is now more important then ever.

A Post-Election Message



Dear Friends,

Let me begin by emphatically stating - CalTrout is a non-partisan organization. Our most ardent supporters are of all political stripes, united by a common concern for the future of wild fish and rivers of our state.

But now, a Trump administration will bring change and potential challenges to our mission to ensure resilient wild fish in healthy California waters.

As Governor Brown said last month, 'if Trump gets elected, I am going to build a wall around California'. He was joking. Yet, the joke may become a metaphor for our strategy to protect California's environmental regulations. California has long set an example for other states to follow, and we cannot allow our values to be compromised by weakened federal regulations.

Near term, our principal concern is the weakening of federal environmental protection laws and reduced federal funding for conservation projects. As we look at how our portfolio of work could be impacted, concerns include:

- •a weakened Endangered Species Act potentially impacting our precedent setting Shasta Safe Harbor and Southern steelhead work;
- •a weakened Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) could mean less consideration for fish in the way dams are managed;
- •a decrease in protections for Federal Wild and Scenic Rivers could leave rivers like the Smith vulnerable; •an underfunded Forest Service could jeopardize our Sierra Meadows work;
- •a weakened Clean Water Act could compromise our efforts to ensure clean, cold water for both fish and people;

Conservation-Continued

Commencing immediately, we begin the work to assess and manage these risks. We are reviewing our projects to identify which have a strong federal nexus—either dependent on federal law (eg, ESA, Clean Water Act) or on federal funding. If federal law leaves our resources exposed to exploitation, then we will ensure that existing or amended California regulations fill the gap.

Fortunately, California has strong state laws—the Public Trust Doctrine, Fish and Game Code 5937 dictating adequate flows below dams, and predominant state control over water rights to name a few. We will be proactive in Sacramento and will continue our work to empower those laws.

Our organization has always been a voice for the entire state of California, whether urban or rural, farmer or fisherman. We are fortunate to have strong local support for our projects through our regional approach of working with diverse interests. This will become increasingly important.

Threats to our mission come in many forms. This is just the latest. CalTrout is uniquely positioned, leading by example, to solve complex resource issues that balance the needs of wild fish and people.

With your continued involvement and our 45 years of experience and success we will navigate through these uncertain times together.
