### Reflections in the Pond

TVFF will support "Save the Delta" and Oppose the CA Twin Tunnels.

At the last TVFF Board Meeting the issue of if the club could support a political agenda, or cause, was discussed. Discussion on the matter took up over half the meeting. The main issue was, can we as a 501 C(7) organization support political issues, by both taking a position and with financial support. As one of the board present had internet access, we discovered that as a c(7) we can support causes in line with the purposes of the club. Subsequent to the meeting, I spoke with my accountant about the matter. She was President last year of Tri-Valley Trail Blazers, an equestrian organization, which is also a 501C organization, and which opposed the expansion of the motorcycle park out off Tesla Rd.

She reinforced the idea that we could support political agendas which aligned with the interest of the club as long as we limited our monetary support to less than \$250,000. After reviewing our financials, I feel comfortable that we won't exceed this limitation in any case.

The issue which caused this discussion was the California Twin Tunnels Project which would divert water from the Delta and ship it South. Current environmental studies indicate this would have a devastating ecological impact on the fish in the Delta and therefore on both commercial and recreational fishing as well as changing the ecology of the area. As a result of our discussion, the members who voted unanimously adoped the following resolution.

RESOLVED: Tri-Valley Fly Fishers would support "Save the Delta" and oppose the California Twin Tunnels to divert water away from the Delta.

# Fuller Lake August 11 - 14

As I mentioned at May meeting, TVFF is planning another trip to Fuller lake, a PGE facility in the Yuba Gap area,

Members of the Club have fished Fuller Lake for many years, so since we keep coming back, it must be fun.

Fuller Lake is good float tube or pontoon sized at 69 acres. (For comparison, Shadow Cliffs is listed at 80 acres). Boats and motors are allowed with a maximum speed limit. There is a concrete launch ramp available, as well as a walk-in shallow shore line at the dam end of the lake used mostly by inflatables if desired. It is stocked regularly by DFW and contains both rainbow and brown trout. There is a good biomass of insect life there, with Callibaetis, Longhorn caddis and midges being the most prominent.

I started fly fishing with a 6 wt rod, however I currently fish put-and-take lakes with a 4 wt rod, using both floating and sinking lines. Either class of rod will be perfectly adequate. For flies, Sheep Creek Specials, Zug Bugs, Jay Fair Wiggle Tail nymphs, soft hackles, Adams, Elk Hair Caddis and midge imitations will all score at some time. A few years ago I caught four 14" browns in about 10 minutes on a Copper John #14.

White Cloud campground is about 66 miles east of Yuba City at about 4000 feet. It is a typical NFS facility, with potable water and flush toilets. I have reserved Site 14, LOOP 1 for Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights. The lake is about 16 miles, about 25 minutes farther east of the campground.

This article will be the only announcement of this trip, so pass the word if you know of someone interested. Also, since there is no July meeting, June meeting will be the best chance to sign up. Otherwise, please call me to receive further info.

As always, I will via email provide all those who show interest in the trip with the contact info of others that may be looking to share ride, tent space, meals etc.



# Caples Lake — July 8-10

Caples Lake is located 59 miles east of Jackson along Highway 88 a couple miles short of Carson Pass at an elevation of 7,800 feet. The 600 acre lake has 6 miles of shoreline. Small craft are allowed on the lake with a 5 MPH speed limit. The Launch Ramp is completed. At nearly 8000 ft the nights can be cool. There is a no-reservation campground on the north side and Caples Resort with rooms and cabins for those wanting a bit more comfort. Kirkwood Station is only 1/2 mile east of the spillway and an interesting place for a beer and hamburg. Food is also available at the resort and at a couple places in the Kirkwood ski area.



The lake is heavily stocked with fingerlings and catchable rainbows several times each summer. It holds rainbows and lake trout (Mackinaws) up to 10 lbs or more.

Most fishermen use spinning gear or troll for the big trout. However, fly fishing along the east side from the dam to Emigrant Bay can be very productive. Wooly Buggers and Calibaetis imitations should work well. As the summer progresses the fish tend to look more for things like Rubber Legs and the bigger terrestrials.

I must admit I have never fished Caples although I have been fishing the area every summer for over 15 years, I have fished Kirkwood and Red Lake in wet seasons but I mostly. fish Woods Lake which is just above Caples.


#### 5/4; Lower Stan Bust

At the end of the day I had nothing to show but a selfie of me at the dam. However I did take note of quite a few wild fig trees for a June trip when they should be ripe!



#### 5/7; O'neill Forebay First Striper

Okay so the very first TVFF meeting I attended was last October and featured Bill Scharninghausen speaking on stripers in the forebay. His talk really resonated with me because one of the motivators for joining the club was to expand my fly fishing horizons beyond small stream Sierra trout. I've gone to the forebay about 5 times since and the bay won each time. Well, there were a few minor successes, but on "other gear" that I won't mention here. Finally this trip put me onto my first fly rod striper! It was a starter size fish at about 17" but enough to get the striper skunk off my float tube. Furthermore, it was on a new rod so that's probably going to turn out to be a good stick!

Oh yeah, particulars for the day – it was overcast with a few showers and a fair amount of wind in the morning (i.e. enough to warrant a close eye on position and drift). The fish came in on a chartreuse/white 1/0 clouser right off the shore in about 5' of water at the parking area near the power lines.

#### 5/20-22; Truckee and LT with Steve Ruley and Guide Matt Heron

Steve and I met up with Matt Heron May 20-22, for the Truckee/ LT outing. We kicked off Friday afternoon with a ½ day at the Glenshire bridge, just a little way out of town. The fishing was a bit slow, but the weather kept it pretty exciting!

Saturday we traveled out to the little Truckee and spent the first half of the day between Stampede and Boca reservoirs. The morning brought several hook ups and a few to the net. The majority of the action was on 2 or 3 nymph rigs with baetis imitations under a glo bug, worm, or rubber legs. During the latter half of the morning the water was carpeted with 1000s of PMDs, however only 2 or 3 fish were rising to these. To make matters worse these few rising fish were about 5'10' back under an overhanging rock outcropping that hung down to about 2'-3' from the surface. Matt and I had enough of those few fish teasing us so we took to casting a dry fly for them. It was tough going to; a) get a cast under the rock, b) time and place the cast, c) manage the mend, and d) track our fly in the shadows against all the naturals. Long story short after warming up these fish I passed the rod to Matt who coaxed a nice brown up and to the net.

After lunch on Saturday we moved down river a bit and tried our hand at more nymphing and streamers. A short time later we picked up and moved back West to the "Schoolyard" on the Truckee. We fished the same nymph rigs, had a handful of opportunities and brought the Rainbow in the picture to the net.

Sunday we travelled back to the Hirschdale exit and fished North of the bridge. Steve opened the morning right away with the awesome Brown he's showing off in the picture below. What a start to the day! We spent a little time below the bridge, then moved north and finished the morning back on the other side of 80, still on Hirschdale. All told the day brought several opportunities and I think Steve had about 3 in the net. But who's counting after that Brown!



### May Fish-Out in Old Mexico

The Yucatan was the distention for six adventurous Tri-Valley pescadores. On April 26 Martin Plotkin, Marty Loomis and Daniel Kitts flew into Cancun, with a stop at Hertz, spent a few days exploring some of the Mayan ruins in the area and sucking down cervesas on the sunny beaches. Yea, you are right, sounds like a family vacation. Rob and Rich Fletcher and I flew down on Friday the 29th, rented a car and met the others in Playa de Carmen for a quick overnight before caravanning south to the small fishing village of Xcalak in the state of Quintana Roo. Along the way we stopped at the ruins of Tulum, had a hambergesa lunch and gassed up in Felipe Carillo Puerto. Our two lane highway, 307, is a very well paved road with wide shoulders (puts Calif roads to shame) and speed bumps near congested areas. For some odd reason Daniel couldn't resist hitting those bumps at 50 miles per hour, much to the dismay of Marty and Martin.

The five and half hour drive was rewarded with a 45 second drive through the quaint pueblo of Xcalak. Settling into our lodge, Tierra Maya, we assembled our gear' had a great dinner and hit he sack in anticipation of six days of flats fishing for bone fisth, tarpon and permit. The rooms were great and and there was only one whiner. "Where's the air conditioning", "Do other rooms have A/C", " I wish we had air conditioning". Marty obviously was in the Air Force, not the Marines. With a high of 86 deg. in the afternoon and a 6 AM temperature of 84 degrees, the constant Caribbean breeze made it quite comfortable.

A 15 minuet ride in our pangas brought us into Chatumal Bay, a vast ecosystem of big water, bays, coves ,beaches and mangroves. The first three fishing days were tough, though everyone caught fish, just not in the numbers expected. Wind,high water and overcast made sight fishing difficult even for the guides. The next three days got progressively better, weather and fish wise. The group managed to rack up a list of bone fish, perch, jacks, tarpon, barracuda and even the illusive permit. I hate you Rob Fletcher! Rob not only caught a weary permit but caught two. No rookie does that. All in all it was an enjoyable trip with plenty of water time and great food (is the fish fresh) at the lodge.

TVFF next Mexico outing is an inshore Sea of Cortez trip in Sept. I washed and repacked my cloths and accessories so all I have to do is switch out the 8wt gear for 10wt. Can hardly wait.

## Conservation Doug Witmore

### 1. Election of Zone 7 Board members in June 7th Primaries

Information for this statement comes from April 28th and May 5th publications of The Independent. Seven candidates are competing for three seats on the Zone 7 Water Agency board in the June 7th primary election. For those of us who object to the tunnel construction(Delta Fix), this is the time to take stock of Zone 7 Board incumbents' Delta Fix positions and vote appropriately in the June Primaries. We should also scrutinize challengers as to what they support and their qualifications. Our due diligence here is important to the future environmental health of the San Francisco/San Juaquin Bay Delta and the potential high cost of construction of the tunnels.

### Positions of incumbents up for re-election and challengers:

Dick Quigley-Resoundingly supportive of the Delta Fix.
Sandy Figuers-Supports some type of the Delta Fix.
Angela Ramirez Holmes-has not supported the Delta tunnel construction.

Eric Thiel-says he is leaning towards not supporting the Delta Fix but could change his opinion as he gets more information, focus on environment, feels the cost of construction of the tunnels could be more like \$50 billion rather than \$16 billion.

Alfred Exner-Questions how costs of the Delta Fix will be funded, feels we should take actions that are best for the Delta and it's environment, in general is not an advocate of the Delta Fix at this point.

Victor Karpenko-is awaiting Environmental Impact Report, Questions costs of the Delta fix and construction cost may be high. Not sure where he stands on support of tunnel construction.

### **Voting recommendations:**

An Independent Editorial dated 05/05/2016 recommends voting for incumbent, Angela Ramirez Holmes, and challenger, Eric Thiel. The editorial did not support returning Dan Quigley and Sandy Figuers to the Board. The Editorial did not take a stand on a third candidate. Consider casting your third vote to either Alfred Exner or Victor Karpenko.

The following list is a suggestion of materials to bring on Monday. We always have extra material to share. Don't be afraid to substitute.

### Parachute Hopper

8-12 nymph hook 2-3xl

Dry fly dubbing what ever color you want your hopper to be.....Tan, yellow, golden, green etc.

Pheasant tail, turkey quill for legs Calf tail or poly yarn for post Turkey quill for wing Hackle to match abdomen or wing

### Foam Hopper

8-12 nymph hook 3xl
6/0 thread that when spun counter
clockwise will lay flat. This will help prevent
thread from cutting into foam.
(Danville's flat waxed nylon)
2mm foam layered, super glue strips
together to form 4 to 6mm thick strips.
Tan over yellow, brown over tan, brown
over green....what ever
rubber legs, centipede legs
super glue
razor blades or Excato knife
