Delta Striper Outing December 10, 2016 Tom Vargas

As TVFF Fishmaster I will lead the striper outing on Saturday, December 10th. This is a great opportunity to experience hard pulling, double digit freshwater fish on fly gear. We will fish the Southern bays of Discovery Bay and plan to launch out of Orwood Resort by 7:00AM. You should arrive at least ½ hour earlier in order to set up and get your boat in the water. We will head South about one mile to the Kellogg Creek entrance of Discovery Bay. This is an all-safe 5 mph area and it works well for both small and larger size watercraft. The outing will take place in rain or shine, but plan on a cold morning and the possibility of morning fog for a few hours.

A boat is required to participate in this trip. Boaters and non-boaters will need to make arrangements and get paired up before the outing.

Equipment: 8, 9 or 10 wt. rods with Hi-Speed / High Density shooting heads. Lead core heads, Teeny 300-400, Rio Outbound or SA Custom Tip Express lines trimmed to match the rod all work well. The integrated style lines and tungsten heads are easier to cast than lead core. Your leader is simply 5-6 ft of 15 - 20 lb mono (Maxima). Flies that simulate baitfish patterns such as 3-5 inch Clouser Minnows, Flashtail Whistlers, Deceivers, etc. work well. The 2/0 chartreuse and white Clouser is a standard. Take a look at at Dan Blanton's Board for what is currently happening.

We will provide more information as we get closer to the outing and we can get more specific as the stripers keep move in, which usually starts around mid to late October. It is looking like a good season this year with lots of early stripers being caught out in the Western Delta!

Activity: Trout fishing at remote rivers and lakes about 15 to 45 minute flying time from the lodge (weather permitting).

Cost: Canadian \$2,650 (about US\$2,050) as of this week.

Limited: 8 anglers max. – 4 min. The first 8 deposits received will go.

Deposit: US \$500 before October 7th, 2016.

Pyramid Lake Fall Float Tubing Outing Bob McCollum

- In early October, Kelly Ng, Wynn Smith and I participated in a guided float tubing outing on Pyramid Lake put on by Pyramid Lake guide Rob Anderson. We joined a group of about 11 other fly fishers from other parts of Northern California.
- Typically in the Fall a thermocline sets up in which the water in the shallows warms to the high 60's, which attracts Tui Chub, a favored food source for the resident Lohantan Cutthroat Trout. The trout tend to hang out in the deeper, colder water just off the shallows and come into the shallows early and late in the day to feed on the chub. This year was not typical. Cold, windy weather the week prior collapsed the thermocline causing the water in the shallows to be in the low 60s and drawing the chub and trout into the shallows all day.
- We had beautiful mild weather with a light breeze great conditions for float tubing, and not having to worry about being blown across the lake. We fished North of Monument Rocks and followed the fish in our tubs about a quarter mile further North.
- Rob provided a great into session on fishing balanced minnow patterns on sinking lines by strip-retrieving them deep and jigging them. We learned quickly that these fish like a very fast retrieve. In the end, we all caught fish and had a great time together.



2017 Pyramid Lake Outings, Spring and Fall:

Spring 2017 Pyramid Lake Outing: Last month I put out an e-mail and a sign up sheet for the spring Pyramid Lake Outing. This is a guided outing with Rob Anderson and Co. The Spring fishing is from step ladders which Rob provides and sets up on the edge of the drop off. The ladder allows you to cast further and keeps you warmer by keeping most of your body out of the water. Sounds odd, but it's a lot a fun. The ladders are set about 25 feet apart so it becomes a very social outing with good-natures banter, bragging, ribbing. The fish, two species of Lohantan Cutthroat Trout typically run from 4-8 pounds. , But there is the very real potential to hook and land a double-digit monster. See pictures from past years.

Dates: Friday March 24 through Saturday March 25. (Potential option for third day on Thursday, March 23 if enough interest - min. 6 anglers.) We will be joining guide Rob Anderson who will be hosting a seminar for the group for the outing. Rob will be providing ladders, flies and breakfast/lunch for both days and the cost is \$190/person for two days (March 24-25). The option for the 23rd will cost an additional \$90/angler, minimum 6 anglers. Advance payment required to hold your spot. Reservations are first come-first served based on receipt of payment. Please send me an e-mail letting me know if your intent to sign on and whether you want 2 or 3 days of fishing. Then snail-mail me a check for \$190 to reserve your spot.

A Novel of Murder, Mystery, Love, Indiscretion and Hunting



FALL RIVER FISHING -- OCTOBER 12-13, 2016 Gene Heiman

My son and I fished the Fall River upstream from Fall River Mills, CA, for 2 days with guide Bob Norman. Weather was changing, but no rain. Beautiful area with Mt. Shasta in view most of the time. With the weather cool, there was no hatch so fished with nymphs and leach patterns using sinking tip lines on #6 rods and 18' leaders.

All fishing on the Fall River is from an outboard skiff because all shores of the river are private pastures or rice fields. Fishing was slow with a lot of 4" fish on the take. My biggest fish was an 18" rainbow taking a #18 nymph. Also caught a 16" and a 17" bow on a #12 leach. I have also fished the same river in July, but it gets quite warm in the summer.

There are several nice lodges in the area on the river including Spinner Falls and the Circle 7 ranch (http://spinnerfalllodge.com/houses/).

Heritage Trout Water Proposed for South Fork Smith

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) is proposing to designate the **South Fork Smith River as a Heritage Trout Water** under the Department's Heritage and Wild Trout Program. We enthusiastically support the CDFW for taking the initiative and **hope you'll join us in advocating for this substantial additional protection for the South Fork Smith River.**

The Smith River has long been considered one of California's most pristine watersheds. The free-flowing Smith River—without a single dam along its entire length—makes it one of the crown jewels of the National Wild and Scenic River program. The Smith River is a recognized Salmon Stronghold, sustaining high quality habitat and abundant and thriving populations of several native salmon and trout species. The South Fork Smith supports both resident and anadromous cutthroat trout life histories, resident coastal rainbow trout, and world-class steelhead. Perennially cold and clear waters sustain these fish and offer un-matched recreational fishing opportunities.

There truly is no better place in California for this special designation.

This Heritage Trout designation will ensure the Smith River has adequate resources for long-term protection, provide opportunities for research and monitoring, and offer a venue in which to engage the public in meaningful dialogue on the value of resource protection and stewardship.

CalTrout has long sought to protect the Smith River and its incredible beauty and unique resource values. We participated in the effort to extend Wild and Scenic designation to the Smith, we championed land acquisitions that have cumulatively protected over 476 square miles of the Smith River as a National Recreation Area, and we've supported ESA protection of native salmon and steelhead in the Smith.

The <u>Wild Trout Program</u> was established by the California Fish and Game Commission (Commission) in 1971 and was later expanded in 1998 to include California heritage trout. With the program goal to "recommend new waters to be designated as wild trout fisheries to the Commission", there is no better time nor place for this special designation.
