


Sacramento, and the East Walker all year round. Or take a nice leisurely guided float down the lower Sac for a day full of fat rainbows. Who said the season is closed?

Pyramid Lake Outing (Chico Fly Fishers) - March 9-10

Chico Fly Fishers has extended an invitation to TVFF members for their Pyramid Lake outing. See the following page for information on the TVFF outing to Pyramid on March 16.

The Pyramid Lake Fish Out with Rob Anderson is scheduled for March 9 & 10, Saturday & Sunday. Rob will supply a continental breakfast (muffin and coffee) and lunch both days. The fishing can be very good this time of year and also cold and windy so dress warm. Always easier to peel the clothing off than not have them. 5-7wt rods are what I believe most use, one with a floating line the other with a sinking line like a Teeny 200 or similar. You need to supply your own gear, fly rods, tippet and flies. Rob will supply ladders.

Those of us that take RVs normally will stay at Pelican and Rob or one of the other guides (depending how many fishermen sign up) meet with us on Friday evening to talk about set up, and time to meet, and place for the next morning's fish. If you are not going to stay in an RV there are a couple other options. If you make reservations far enough in advance, Crosby Lodge has cabins and RVs for rent, you can bring your own food and cook or eat at their store. Call them at 775-476-0400. The other option is to stay in Sparks or Reno. The Nugget Casino in Sparks is reasonable and pretty nice. It's still about an hour commute one way and makes for an early morning departure for Pyramid. Call 800-648-1177 or check out the web site.

Cost of the two day fish out is \$200 per angler. You can also purchase a dozen flies for \$35 that come in a fly box. If you are interested in coming, send me a check for \$200 made out to Rob Anderson and if you want the dozen flies make the check for \$235. Don't count on purchasing them from him when you get there, he may not have any.

Also, Rob Anderson gives a talk at the Nugget Casino in Sparks on February 15 (Friday evening) on fishing Pyramid Lake. There is no charge and it's worth the time. You'll need to go to his web site and sign up because it does get full.

Pyramid Lake Outing (TVFF) - March 16

This fishout will be guided by Pyramid Fly Company. Fishing will be from elevated fishing chairs instead of ladders. Many of us cannot stand on a ladder and this is a safer alternative. The chairs will be supplied by the guides.

For those of you who wish to fish from shore, there is conventional casting and also using chucker rods, basically roll casting a heavy line with a two-handed rod. Pyramid Fly will supply the rods, flies and instruction. This is a fun way to fish and can be very useful when fishing in areas where overhead casting is not possible. Those of us who have tried it are hooked on it.

The cost includes a day of fishing with breakfast and a deli style lunch. For an extra \$15 you can add an excellent BBQ rib dinner at Crosby Lodge. Breakfast will consist of bagels, cream cheese, fruit, orange juice and coffee. The



guiding will be approximately one guide to five fishermen. The cost will be \$125 for the day including breakfast, lunch and flies, or \$140 with the dinner. A Pyramid Lake fishing permit is required and must be purchased separately. A Nevada fishing license is not required.

For those who wish to fish on Friday before or Sunday afterward, guiding arrangements can be made, or you can do your own thing.

There are lots of choices for accommodations. You can buy a camping permit and camp at Pelican Point or on any beach, the marina has an RV park, and Crosby Lodge has camp sites, cabins and trailers for rent, including some nice 5th wheel trailers that will accommodate 4-6 easily (nice hot showers). We are currently working with Crosby's to get a special rate, and of course there are the casinos in Sparks and Reno approximately 35 miles away. To make reservations at the lake, you can call Crosby Lodge at 775-476-0400.

Additional information:

- Hooks must be barbless. No "bait" is allowed.
- Limit is two fish maximum, one or two 17 to 20" or one over 24", all measured fork length.
- Recommend a 6-8 weight rod remember some of these fish get up to 20 pounds.
- Additional information is available at the Pyramid Lake web site.

Member Outing Report

Feather River Steelhead – Alan Wyosnick

What a difference a week makes!

We had to move the outing from January 5th to January 12th due to heavy rain and high winds. However, our patience was rewarded with sunshine, no wind and a high of 63 degrees (water temp was in the low 40's) on the 12th. Eight club members carpooled together up to Oroville very early that morning: Patrick Donovan, Ron Dueltgen, Rob Farris, Todd Hyrn, Chris McCann, Robert Nishio, Mark Spruiell and Alan Wyosnick. For most everyone it was the first time they had fished the Feather River, and for Todd and Mark it was the first time they had matched wits with a Steelhead.

We were lucky to have a lot of tight lines that day with 26 Steelhead hooked and ultimately 11 of

those brought to the net. Fortunately everyone had at least two hook ups that day with Mark bringing the largest one into his net estimated to be about 22 inches...he wasn't able to snap a picture but he did have a witness:) The most exciting moments of the day were when you set the hook and you never knew what the fish was going to do. We had one make a sudden U-turn and go right between Ron's legs, we had others that put on a spectacular aerial display, some refused to show themselves at all and one that made a reel-screaming run leaving only 10 feet of backing left on the reel before it unhooked itself.

We used a fairly traditional nymph fishing method with short to medium distance casts and drifts. It was a two-fly setup with the appropriate amount of added weight above the top fly to feel the stream bed along with an indicator large enough to detect the generally subtle takes. There was no one secret fly as we had success with many patterns: San Juan and Squirmy worms, Alevin imitation, Hares Ear, Damsel Fly nymph, BWO and Copper John's.

We took a mid-day stream-side break for nutrition and swapping notes. We ended the day at a local establishment (Miners Alley Brewing) with a celebratory beer to our good luck, great companionship and perfect weather before we made the 2.5 hour drive back home.

Fly Tiers Library and Trading Post (LTP)

Most fly tiers, like me, have materials which would probably last several life-times. Often, to tie a new fly, we need a small amount of material which means buying some from the net, which may arrive next week, or jumping in the car for an hour+ drive to a fly shop in the area.

To remedy this, we are creating the LTP. The LTP has 2 resources: the Library for getting small amounts of material (a couple of feathers, small swatch of hair, etc.) and the Trading Post for exchanging your excess with others. Here are the details of how it will work. Both the library and Trading Post are only available to members.



Library: The library will be supported by donations of fly tying material from members. The material will be packaged in gallon sized zip locks with colored labels about the contents. Any member may take a small amount of material for a project and make a modest donation (\$1 min). The donations will be used to buy supplies and, if any is left over, other material for the library.

Trading Post: The trading post allows members to exchange excess tying material for other material. Any member may submit a gallon sized zip-lock bag with the material along with a very brief description to Jim Broadbent. Jim will assess a point value to the material based on his experience (Jim's decision is final). The material will be labeled with a different colored label than the library. Members may exchange their points for material in the trading post. Martin Plotkin will arrange for the LTP to show up at all general, board and fly tying meetings. It can also be accessed by special arrangement made with Martin.

LTP kicks-off, at the meeting, on Thursdays so bring your Trades and Donations.

Conservation Corner

California Red-legged Frog – Mitchie McCammon

When I let my husband know that I was researching the threatened California red-legged frog, his voice got a soft, melancholy tone and he said, "My dad would have loved to talk about this frog." You see, his father was a fisheries biologist at the Department of Fish and Game in the 1960s, 70s, and 80s. In honor of my father-in-law I hope to tell you a bit about our state amphibian.

The California red-legged frog is the largest native frog in the western United States and is found almost exclusively in California. Mark Twain made the frog famous in his short story "The Celebrated Jumping Frog of Calaveras County." It ranges in size from 1.5 to 5 inches long (4 to 13 cm). It is named for the reddish coloring on the underside of its legs and belly. The head can be red to brown or gray and has small black spots on its legs. There are two prominent lateral folds on its back.



The California red-legged frog occupies a fairly distinct habitat, combining both specific water (aquatic) and upland (terrestrial) components. California red-legged frog habitat includes nearly any area within 1-2 miles of a breeding site that stays moist and cool through the summer; this includes non-breeding aquatic habitat in pools of slow-moving streams, perennial or ephemeral ponds, and upland sheltering habitat such as rocks, small mammal burrows, logs, densely vegetated areas, and even man-made structures (i.e., culverts, livestock troughs, spring-boxes, and abandoned sheds).



Breeding sites are generally found in deep, still or slow-moving water (greater than 2.5 feet) and can have a wide range of edge and emergent cover amounts. California redlegged frogs can breed at sites with dense shrubby riparian or emergent vegetation, such as cattails, tules, or overhanging willows or can proliferate in ponds devoid of emergent vegetation and any apparent vegetative cover (i.e., stock ponds).¹

American bullfrogs are considered one of the main threats to the California red-legged frog.

The bullfrog is a non-native species that was introduced at the turn of the 20th century for a food source. It has been said the bullfrog has larger legs but the Red Legged frog has a better taste. Another thing that has contributed to the decline of the population is development in the frog habitat and agricultural pollution in the form of pesticides. Organizations such as the Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy and the National Wildlife Federation are working to restore wetland habitat and to reintroduce the frogs to watersheds.

Text from Assembly Bill No. 2364:

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. THE LEGISLATURE FINDS AND DECLARES ALL OF THE FOLLOWING:

- a) THE CALIFORNIA RED-LEGGED FROG IS THE LARGEST NATIVE FROG IN THE WESTERN UNITED STATES AND IS FOUND ALMOST EXCLUSIVELY IN CALIFORNIA WITH A FEW SIGHTINGS IN BAJA CALIFORNIA AND MEXICO.
- b) The California red-legged frog is particularly well known as a result of Mark Twain's famous short story "The celebrated Jumping Frog of Calaveras County," which featured the species.
- c) The California red-legged frog's unique place in California's history extends as far back as the 19th century Gold Rush. Miners, known as forty-niners, consumed nearly 80,000 frogs per year, nearly eating the species into extinction.
- d) While the California red-legged frog no longer has to fear the fork, the species continues to face myriad natural and manmade threats, including the introduction of invasive species into the California red-legged frog's habitat, as well as habitat loss. In fact, according to the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, populations of the California red-legged frog have disappeared from nearly 70 percent of its historically known habitat. In May 1996, the species was listed as a federal threatened species, with the state also classifying it as a species of special concern and subject to protection in June 1996.
- e) Declaring the California red-legged frog as the official state amphibian of California will acknowledge the species' important place in the ecology, culture, and history of California, as well as broadcast and reinforce the state's commitment to protecting endangered species.

SECTION 2. Section 422.7 is added to the Government Code, to read:

422.7. THE CALIFORNIA RED-LEGGED FROG (RANA DRAYTONII) IS THE OFFICIAL STATE AMPHIBIAN.²


